

## **Transition Checklist for Parents**and Carers

Many things change as your child becomes a young adult. The process of shifting out of school and away from paediatric care to adult services will start when your son or daughter turns 16 years of age. These changes, and your son or daughter's options for post-school life, will be discussed during school transition clinics so that it all goes as smoothly as possible. Your transition support teacher or transition care coordinator can guide and assist you to complete any forms or applications.
